The Centre's teaching and publications address current issues in gender, feminism and development.

#### **DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE**

We have been consolidating our institutional identity as IGS at LMH making rapid progress in an important key research priority related to IGS long-term engagement with Myanmar/Burma. We are developing research programmes reflecting members' research interests, whilst marking **30 years of IGS** (formed in 1983 as the Centre for Cross Cultural Research on Women) with a series of anniversary lectures and workshops as well as exhibitions and concerts. Celebrations will last well into next year and we hope they add a cerebral buzz as well as celebratory shine to our Centre's activities!

Reference was made in the last issue of IGS Newsletter to our response to Patron Daw Aung San Suu Kyi's challenge to the University of Oxford for academic investment into education in her country. The Centre's identity is known as cross-cultural and gender studiescentred, with a preference for transformative research. We have commenced our long-term commitment to Myanmar with a funded Junior Research Fellowship (the Daw Aung San Suu Kyi JRF) to address critical questions in relation to Burmese contexts of gendered cultures of education and aspiration. The project requires collaboration and consultation with local partners so I just returned from a visit to Myanmar exploring issues with people from a broad spectrum of occupation, gender, generation and status. Education in Myanmar is a site of political and cultural contestation, both highly regimented and also fragmented. Such societal complexity demands that as we offer models of education, capacity and leadership training, we must remind ourselves of the limitations of any intervention. Referencing one of our ancestors of educational reform, Mary Wollstonecraft, it is wise to remember 'Till society be differently constituted, much cannot be expected from education.'

Today 8th May **Professor Rosi Braidotti** delivers the Barbara E. Ward Commemorative Lecture commencing the IGS 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary programme. As a distinguished and influential feminist thinker and philosopher she will lecture on 'Writing as a Nomadic Subject.' IGS website features this anniversary year with details of Workshops (also as below) and Anniversary Lectures, with a Special Events Day on November 13th and a programme comprising a lecture by Baroness Helena Kennedy QC: and showcasing of IGS current research, in particular work from our evolving Myanmar programme. We conclude our anniversary celebrations with Mary Robinson, former President of Ireland, as the guest Commemorative Lecturer in May 2014.
