FROM THE PRINCIPAL

I am delighted to serve as Principal of LMH at such a significant moment in the College's history. Over the three decades that I've been a Fellow and tutor here, I have developed longstanding and deep connections with our alumni community. I now look forward to leading LMH's 150th Campaign, building on the excellent financial foundations laid by my predecessor, Stephen Blyth.

For the past two years I have worked in the central university, helping develop and deliver the new Schwarzman Centre for the Humanities. I've seen first-hand how a major philanthropic gift can create incredible new public spaces for the university. Yet the transformative impact of philanthropic giving to a college such as LMH is immeasurably greater. Colleges remain the bedrock of the Oxford student experience. When world-leading academics work closely with students in a tutorial setting, week on week, the outcomes are extraordinary. Students, whatever their background, will develop their capacity for thought, argument and expression to meet the demands of today's world. An Oxford college education has never been more valuable. LMH's diverse, inclusive and welcoming community and its tranquil riverside setting offer our students a unique place to live and study.

Yet tutorial teaching is expensive. Student fee income covers barely 40% of the real cost of studying at Oxford. College makes up the shortfall. LMH has worked hard in recent years to develop our commercial revenue. The New Era Building project, completed in 2017, transformed LMH's appearance and our ability to house all undergraduates,

while also enhancing our commercial potential for hosting conferences and summer programmes. But we know that the most powerful way to improve a college's finances is by growing its endowment. LMH, as one of the younger colleges (founded in 1878 as opposed to 1249!) has had less time to accrue resources and build an endowment. This impacts upon our ability to secure our tutorial teaching through endowed Fellowships, to support our Fellows' research, and to subsidise student costs to remain on a par with other colleges.

LMH is heading towards its 150th anniversary – an opportunity to celebrate all that is great about our past while looking ahead with a clear and ambitious vision for the future. As we mark this milestone, we will continue to strengthen the College for future generations by investing in the people, ideas and spaces that define LMH. My colleagues on Governing Body join with me in thanking all of our alumni and donors who are helping us to put LMH on a secure financial footing for the future. With your help, we have the opportunity to make this anniversary a transformative moment in the College's history.

TREASURER'S UPDATE

I'm delighted to report that the College's endowment climbed above £60M for the first time in our history at the end of this financial year.

"Estates Bursars", as Treasurers or Bursars are officially called, meet twice a term to discuss financial and administrative matters across the Collegiate University. These meetings offer insights into effective college management, from setting a prudent endowment drawdown rate to avoiding dependence on restricted funds for cash flow.

Two "home truths" about colleges from Estates Bursars are relevant to LMH's finances this year. First, that wealth doesn't necessarily correlate with operational efficiency. At LMH, we see ourselves as an example of a poorer College operating at above-average levels of efficiency. This is in no small part down to the incredible work of our former Domestic Bursar, Bart Ashton, who left at Christmas after 22 years at LMH to pursue his passion for energy and sustainability with the Zero Carbon Oxford Partnership.

Bart was an inspiring and effective manager to our large team of operational staff. He was known for leading by example, and was always generous with his guidance. His achievements included two big building projects, the new kitchen and other major refurbishments, and the transformation of key service departments, alongside the growth of our commercial business. Bart always said that his trick was to focus relentlessly on staff matters ("it's all about the people"), to bring out the best in colleagues. Thanks to his support, LMH is the only Oxbridge college to be a gold level Investor in People.

The second "home truth" relevant to LMH this year is that the most financially robust colleges in Oxford focus on and consistently make an annual surplus. The cumulative effect of making a consistent trading surplus, coupled with donations and legacies, is transformational. Compounding does its magical work over time, growing the endowment and improving resilience.

After four years of difficult trading during the pandemic, and a debilitating period of inflation in its aftermath, the College

successfully produced a strong overall surplus in 2024-25, as shown in the figures from our Financial Statements on p.5. The performance was bolstered by the receipt of donations and legacies of £5.53m, but the underlying performance of the College was also strong. This was despite inflationary pay settlements, punitive rises in National Insurance payments, and implementing our current policy of keeping undergraduate rent increases flat. The College achieved this through keeping a tight control on costs, whilst the commercial business continued its impressive growth.

During the year, the Estates team renovated 1 Fyfield Road, the first building in our major refurbishment programme, at a cost of £1.6M – mostly funded by the generous Avent legacy (see p.38). The building now houses the College's wellbeing hub for students and includes ten refurbished graduate rooms.

Progress in building financial resilience was again supported by donors' generosity, particularly for the endowment of Tutorial Fellowships, and the College's endowment has climbed above £60M for the first time. We are looking forward to our 150th celebrations in 2028-29 with confidence.





LMH OXFORD SUMMER PROGRAMMES

Sharing the Spirit of LMH with the World

Commercial activity plays a vital role in supporting College life, alongside the generosity of our donors. Helena Beveridge, Director of Conference Services, shares how our growing programme of conferences and summer schools is strengthening the College's financial resilience, while showcasing to visitors the spirit and values that make LMH unique.

For many years, commercial income has been an important source of support for LMH, generated through hosting conferences, events, and summer schools. In 2018 and 2019, the College expanded this activity by partnering with external organisations to offer short academic courses for international students, pushing annual turnover beyond £2M for the first time – a significant milestone.

The pandemic brought all commercial activity to a standstill. As restrictions eased, the College took the opportunity to re-build the summer school and conference business, developing a new approach to short academic programmes and taking full ownership of their design, management, and delivery.

In the summer of 2022, we launched the LMH Oxford Summer Programmes to meet growing demand for high-quality short courses in Oxford. The vision was to create programmes that capture the essence of LMH – student-centred, academically rigorous, and true to the Oxford tutorial tradition – while fostering the sense of community, warmth, and support that defines College life.

Significant investment has gone into establishing this enterprise. A dedicated team has been recruited, and bedroom space previously sold to external providers has been

reserved for College's own use. The first cohort of 80 students joined us in August 2022. Since then, nearly 1,300 students have participated, annual commercial turnover has grown to almost £3M, and the net commercial contribution has totalled £3.7M.

Participants consistently describe their experience as transformative. One student said, "The tutorials were the best hours of my academic life." Another reflected, "The tutorials were an amazing opportunity to exchange ideas – I loved them." A third summed up the atmosphere perfectly: "The environment is amazing – so full of history! Everyone was so friendly and helpful. The moment I introduced myself, I felt at home."

Looking ahead, our ambitions continue to grow. The programmes are expanding year-on-year, with Fellows actively involved in developing new courses for summer 2026. Just after the Alumni Garden Party next June, LMH will once again open its doors to hundreds of students eager to begin their summer studies – the result of a truly College-wide effort across the Short Academic Programme and Conference teams, Housekeeping, Catering, and the Lodge, all working together with Fellows to bring LMH's unique spirit to life for a new audience.

tested, challenged, and refined. This close interaction is transformative: it inspires intellectual curiosity, fosters open debate, and cultivates independent thinking. Our students leave LMH ready not only to succeed, but also to shape the world beyond it.

ENDOWING OUR FELLOWSHIPS


The tutorial system, with its intimate, personalised teaching, is one of the most intensive – and expensive – teaching models in Higher Education.

UK tuition fees, set thirteen years ago and based on the cost of the mass teaching model used in most other English universities, don't cover the cost of delivering our bespoke teaching model. Government contributions have ceased, and so in order to sustain our Fellowships, LMH needs to make up the significant difference from other income sources.

With our operating budget hovering around break-even, employing and retaining experienced, world-leading academics as permanent tutors is a constant challenge. You will all no doubt have memories of the tutors who shaped your time at College. Many go above and beyond to offer academic advice, pastoral support and career guidance. They are the beating heart of the LMH experience. Yet limited and insecure funds mean we cannot provide the same remuneration, job security or resource that their counterparts in richer colleges receive.

Although a few subjects such as Medicine, French, Computer Science and Politics boast a fully-endowed Fellowship, many of the College's subjects remain on an insecure financial footing, with very little or in some cases no endowment funding. We want LMH to continue to be recognised for its excellence in teaching, and its commitment to impactful research. To do this, we need permanent, competitive and secure packages which will attract and retain outstanding academics.

It would cost £28.5M to fully endow our Tutorial Fellowships and secure LMH's precious tutorial system for generations to come. Our sincere thanks to those who have already contributed to their subjects. We hope more will join us and consider giving back to ensure future generations continue to benefit from the same transformative teaching they experienced.



PHYSICS FOR THE FUTURE

In 2025, Sarah Gould (1975, Physics) and Andrew Watson (Balliol, 1972, Physics) made a transformative gift to ensure the long-term future of Physics teaching at LMH. Their generosity has fully endowed one Physics Fellowship and contributed to the endowment of a second. They discuss the experiences and motivations that shaped their decision to invest in the College's academic future.

What were LMH and Balliol like in the 70s? Did your paths first cross at Oxford?

In many ways LMH and Balliol were very similar. Both were single sex during the early 70s, very different from today. That all changed in 1979, when both colleges became co-educational. LMH and Balliol were, and remain, diverse – socially, culturally, and politically. Academic excellence was at forefront for both of us. Perhaps Balliol felt more ‘in the thick of it’ being on Broad Street, but LMH’s quieter location was perfect for studying. When we met, I was an undergraduate and Andy was a postgraduate.

What inspired you to give to LMH?

We have supported a graduate scholarship in Theoretical Physics at LMH since 2020, and this led to a renewed and deepening connection with the College. Having seen first-hand the vibrancy and quality of Physics teaching, and experienced the enthusiasm of the students, we were inspired to find out how we could help. The 150th Anniversary fundraising objective of endowing a Physics Fellowship was a perfect fit with our aspirations.

Why Physics?

Physics helps us understand the fundamental laws that govern the universe, from cosmic scales down to the quantum level. To do this you need mathematical, analytic and problem-solving skills. These skills can be applied to many fields: not just the obvious ones such as engineering and technology but also medicine, finance, artificial intelligence and even policy making and politics. A physicist can turn their hand to almost anything.

What impact do you hope to have?

We hope that the impact of our donation will be threefold. Prospective students will see that LMH is committed to providing ‘in college’ tutorial teaching. This should make the College more attractive, as well as enhancing each student’s educational experience. The endowed Fellowship will provide job

security, which we hope will help LMH to continue to attract and retain the best in a very competitive environment. Finally, the College will be better able to plan and budget knowing that this Fellowship is fully funded. We hope this will give LMH the flexibility to fund other initiatives, such as school outreach and student support programmes.

What would you say to people thinking about giving to LMH?

Broad ranging education of the highest quality is as essential for today’s students as it was for us in the 70s. LMH, Balliol and Oxford enabled so much for us. Independent, long-term funding is needed to ensure that LMH can continue its commitment to excellence in education into the future. We decided to make our donation because we want to be part of that future.



SHAPING FUTURE MINDS

Our students benefit enormously from learning with world-leading Physics researchers who challenge them to think deeply, question assumptions, and apply their knowledge to the world around them.

OUR PHYSICS FELLOWS



**Professor Todd Huffman,
Gould Watson Fellow in Physics**

Professor Huffman's research explores the fundamental building blocks of the universe through his work with the ATLAS detector at the Large Hadron Collider (LHC) near Geneva – the world's most powerful particle accelerator. His team are currently working to produce and study multiple Higgs bosons, the elusive particles that help explain how matter gains mass.



**Professor Gianluca Gregori,
Fellow and Tutor in Physics**

Professor Gregori leads an international team pioneering a new way to create plasma "fireballs" on Earth, replicating the extreme conditions near black holes and neutron stars. Using facilities at CERN, his group has achieved a world first: generating ultra-high-density plasma beams, a breakthrough that opens new possibilities for studying cosmic jets and gamma-ray bursts in the laboratory.

"Teaching undergraduate students here is an exceptionally rewarding experience. It is a privilege to work with many bright, enthusiastic, and intellectually curious young minds. The tutorial system fosters a unique connection, allowing them to ask questions that they wouldn't ask in a lecture theatre full of other students. It is a pleasure to see them learning and mastering difficult physics concepts.

"One thing that is often glossed over is that the undergraduate physics course here in Oxford is extremely advanced, well above what is taught at many other global Universities. It is only through tutorials, intensive and

expensive though they are, that the students can manage to really excel in the course. One memorable example is a student I taught a few years ago, who went on to Harvard for their graduate studies. I met them a few years later and asked how they found it. Their answer was stunning: Harvard was easy; even the graduate courses there were no match for what is taught here in Oxford. I firmly believe the tutorial system here at LMH is what enables all of our students to excel, whether they continue in academia or go into industry."

MY RESEARCH

In 100 Words

From addressing global challenges to exploring fundamental questions, our academics are pushing the boundaries of knowledge across a wide range of disciplines. Here, four of our academics share the essence of their research – and why it matters – in just 100 words.



Dr Jacob Downs, Lecturer and Organising Tutor in Music; Chair of Faculty of Music

“My research explores how digital sound technologies reshape our everyday lives. I’m currently studying why some people play music out loud on the bus, why voice messages seem to be replacing phone calls and texts, and why individuals create private worlds with their headphones. By analysing these phenomena as they emerge, my research aims to reveal how digital sonic media are transforming experiences of intimacy and connection in the twenty-first century, challenging traditional boundaries between private and public spheres. As a BBC/AHRC New Generation Thinker, I disseminate these findings to broader audiences through regular contributions to radio and television broadcasting.”



Dr Eleanor Conole, Junior Research Fellow in Applied Artificial Intelligence

“My research examines what factors drive differences in cognitive decline, how lifestyle and environment shape this process, and how these trajectories can be tracked at the molecular level. I focus on epigenetics – chemical modifications to DNA that act as biological records of lived experience. Using machine learning to analyse genomic, neuroimaging, and cognitive data from population cohorts, I identify patterns linked to accelerated brain ageing. This approach provides insight into the mechanisms that drive heterogeneity in healthy ageing. Ultimately, my research is part of a wider effort to develop biomarkers that signal deviations from healthy ageing and signpost dementia risk.”

Dr Joshua Bennett, Fellow and Tutor in History; Associate Professor in History

“My period’, as historians say in the trade, is the nineteenth century. I am fascinated by how ancient social, political, and religious structures were then coming under pressure from new ideas and revolutionary forces, in ways that ultimately gave rise to the modern world. Within this chronological focus, my research particularly concentrates on the history of ideas and the history of religion. Currently, I am most interested in the history of secularism – a term invented during the nineteenth century – and the way it inspired new ideas of morality and social order in Europe and North America.”



Professor Rachael Bashford-Rogers, Fellow and Tutor in Biochemistry; Associate Professor of Molecular and Cellular Biochemistry

“My work as an immunologist and entrepreneur has helped me develop novel experimental and computational tools to decode the immune system’s role in disease, which are now adopted worldwide. I am working towards revealing how immune cells develop, function, and respond to therapy in health and disease, and to translate these deep insights into high-impact therapeutics. I co-founded Alchemab Therapeutics, a clinical-stage company discovering novel drugs by identifying protective antibodies in healthy survivors. My new venture is pioneering first-in-class post-menopausal therapies by decoding the cellular drivers of aging. My work represents a powerful new paradigm for drug discovery, creating therapies from human health rather than disease.”

GRADUATE SCHOLAR SPOTLIGHT

Graduate students form an integral part of our diverse and dynamic community. Many go on to make significant contributions across academia, industry, and public life, tackling some of the world's most pressing challenges. Graduate scholarships play a vital role in supporting these talented students, ensuring that financial barriers do not stand in the way of academic excellence and innovation. Two recent graduate scholars talk about their experiences.

Syed Muhammad Humaid Adil (2024, MSc Taxation), Oxford Pakistan Programme Scholar

"Before arriving at LMH, I graduated with a First-Class dual degree in Scots and English Law from the University of Aberdeen, where I received the Ranjit Memorial Prize for academic excellence.

I wasn't drawn to LMH only for its academic reputation, but for its deep commitment to social justice. As a British-Pakistani, applying to Oxford felt daunting, given that British-Pakistanis are the most underrepresented BAME group at the graduate level. The Oxford Pakistan Programme (OPP) at LMH provides merit-based and means-tested scholarships to support Pakistani students in attending Oxford. Being an OPP Scholar has made my studies here possible, and I am deeply grateful for that support.

Alongside my academic work, graduate life at LMH has been incredibly enriching. Being elected Co-President of the MCR gave me the chance to represent postgraduate students' views to college officers and work with a talented, energetic committee to deliver social events for our wider community, contributing to College life in a way that felt meaningful.

Academically, my time at LMH has opened new doors. In 2025, I was selected by the Law Faculty to compete in the Nuremberg Mooting Competition as one of four Oxford students. This global legal competition was held in the historic Courtroom 600 of the Nuremberg Palace of Justice, where Nazi war criminals were prosecuted after the Second World War. Our team was awarded the Best Memorandum for the Defence – a first for Oxford – and I was fortunate to win both of our Defence oral submissions,

ranking fourth overall in the competition.

My experiences at LMH and through the OPP Scholarship have inspired me to consider a career at the Bar. The confidence, support, and opportunities I've received here have shaped my ambitions in ways I couldn't have imagined when I first applied."



Jasmin Willis (2023, DPhil Biology), Valerie Mitchell Scholar

"I spent several years working in wildlife conservation before beginning my DPhil at LMH – first as an intern with an organisation dedicated to protecting pangolins, and later as a consultant researching the international wildlife trade. These experiences shaped my academic interests and inspired me to explore more deeply how humans and wildlife interact. What drew me most to LMH was its history and ethos. As someone researching gender, it felt particularly meaningful to join Oxford's first college for women – a community that continues to champion inclusion and progress. From the start, I sensed that LMH was a place where I could truly belong and contribute."

Although I don't live in College, I've really valued the chance to attend formal dinners each term. They provide a wonderful opportunity to connect with LMH's traditions, meet fellow students, and feel part of the wider College community.

Studying at LMH and receiving the Valerie Mitchell Scholarship have made an extraordinary difference to my life. I feel deeply grateful to Valerie Mitchell and LMH for making this possible. Beyond the academic achievement, I've grown enormously as both a researcher and an individual. Most importantly, I've gained the confidence to pursue my ambitions with purpose and self-belief – something that has shaped not only my career but my outlook on life.

As I approach the completion of my DPhil, I'm excited to continue my research journey. I'm currently involved in two excellent research groups in my department and hope to remain at Oxford as a postdoctoral researcher, building on the foundation that LMH has so generously helped me to create."

STUDENT FINANCIAL SUPPORT FUND

Your gifts to the Student Financial Support Fund have been truly life-changing for our students. As Senior Tutor, with responsibility for supporting our students' academic welfare throughout their studies, I continue to be deeply moved by the transformative impact of your generosity.

There is steady and increasing need for financial support for our students, and the continuing impact of the cost of living crisis is palpable. For our UK undergraduates, the maximum maintenance loan package is lower in real terms than it has been since 2016-17. 'Growth' has been and continues to be lower than inflation, and parental contributions are expected from those households with an annual income above £25,000. There have been no changes to this threshold since 2008, certainly in England.

Our postgraduates have fewer 'state loan' possibilities to support themselves and an increasing number seek college support for living costs. LMH has limited graduate accommodation on-site, and so many of our postgraduate students are also at the mercy of the over-heated local housing market.

In addition to supporting students' cost of living needs, we are delighted to provide financial grants for their academic endeavours. This includes funding for research trips to libraries and archives, as well as expenses related to internships and practical lab projects. We also help students take part in academic enrichment activities such as curated visits to the Supreme Court, the Royal Courts of Justice,

and the Houses of Parliament (Law and PPE students); Bletchley Park (Mathematicians, Computer Scientists, and Modern Linguists); the BMW Mini Factory (Economists); and the British Museum (Classics and CAAH students). A quarter of the members of our wonderful Chamber Choir would have been unable to participate in the hugely enriching and successful concert series delivered in Paris last summer without financial support from the College.

You, our alumni and friends, continue to provide a lifeline for our students through your generous donations to our student support funds – assistance that is more vital than ever. Alongside this generosity, we work closely with all our students to help them manage their finances wisely, and as a college, we maximise our own resources to secure additional funding from the wider University wherever possible.

A YEAR IN OUTREACH

Our Outreach programme seeks to inspire high-ability students from all backgrounds to see Oxford as a realistic and welcoming option for them.

In 2024-25 we hosted 20 inbound school visits, welcoming almost 700 students from schools in our link regions. Visitors explored College life, met current students, and learned how to make a strong Oxford application. Our Subject Taster Days in History, Maths & Computer Science, and Classics & Ancient History, plus a STEM Taster Day for Year 10s, offered academic insight and hands-on sessions for over 150 pupils.

We have revamped our Student Ambassador Scheme and now offer paid employment to students who lead visits, support Open Days or participate in digital outreach, sharing their experiences and breaking down stereotypes. We enjoyed record attendance at our Open Days, with subject tutors delivering packed-out sessions across a range of disciplines.

Next year, we will launch a new sustained contact mentoring programme for Year 10–11 students, pairing them with LMH undergraduates for online academic mentoring. We are running this project in partnership with the Department of Economics, who will evaluate and measure its long-term impact.

CHAMPIONING STUDENT SUCCESS

LMH pioneered dedicated study skills support at Oxford through the creation of the Oxford Study Skills Centre in 2018. Just over three years ago, this support was permanently integrated into our wider wellbeing offering – made possible through transformative donations from alumni. Since then, we have delivered more than 750 one-to-one tutorials and an extensive programme of workshops, making the initiative a cornerstone of student success. Study Skills Lecturers Dr Ed Sutcliffe and Dr Emma Lalande share insights into their work with students and its growing impact.

During the last academic year, we supported students with wide-ranging goals. Our tutorials frequently cover topics familiar to many generations: time management, academic writing, revision strategy, and so on. However, we are now working increasingly with students to navigate evolving challenges related to the use of AI, ongoing changes to assessment formats, and multi-layered mental health challenges, which have become more prevalent since Covid.

We are determined to explore the full breadth of our remit by encouraging and engaging students to contextually improve their core academic skills and outputs within their wider life experiences. One new initiative successfully trialled this year was the 'Research Skills Priming' sessions for Fourth Year scientists. These sessions represent a model for subject-specific academic skills expansion, with a view to preparing students for future workplace environments: opening discussions about personal values, teamwork and leadership behaviours, and exercising good laboratory practice.

Feedback shows that our support can make a huge difference to student outcomes and experience. For instance, one Finalist this year commented that, "The Study Skills tutors in LMH are absolutely brilliant. Having access to 1-1 support is amazing and really helped me to prepare for final exams".

The generous endowment of these roles ensures the stability of Study Skills within the academic life of the College. Thanks to this, we are able to focus on tailored student contact, whilst developing fruitful working relationships within the broader LMH community to plan for the future. This academic year, we are busy creating a new online resource hub. This will further enhance our students' autonomy in their study skills improvement, while promoting our existing services and continuing to empower all LMH students to thrive in their academic endeavours.

INVESTING IN OUR ESTATE

LMH is more than a collection of buildings and grounds – it is the backdrop to daily life, a place where students study, play, and build friendships that last a lifetime. With your help, we can continue to improve these spaces so that they reflect the energy, ambition, and spirit of our community.

This year, we were delighted to complete the resurfacing of the tennis courts. These renewed facilities have transformed a much-loved part of student life at LMH. The refreshed courts, complete with new fencing, encourage active living and wellbeing, while bringing students together in a shared space for recreation and connection.

Sophia, an undergraduate studying Mathematics and Statistics, is a keen tennis player who enjoys playing with her university friends and is very grateful for the improved facilities. She says: “Having tennis courts on the LMH grounds is such a privilege; I love popping over after lectures to have a hit with my friends and it makes keeping up my tennis at uni so much easier!”

The restoration of the Wolfson West clock, made possible

through the generous support of Professor Christopher Hodges (1986, Physics), has been another highlight this year. The clock now stands proudly once again at the entrance to LMH, serving as both a welcoming landmark and a symbol of continuity – linking generations of LMH members past and present.

Another significant project in 2025 has been the refurbishment of 1 Fyfield Road. Fyfield Road is now home to our new Wellbeing Hub (bringing Wellbeing, Study Skills, the College Nurse and Doctor under one roof), and also provides much-needed graduate accommodation, with ten new student rooms. You can read more about Cathy Avent’s transformative legacy, which helped make this possible, on p.38 – a wonderful example of the enduring impact of philanthropy at LMH.

TRANSFORMING OUR GARDENS

Almost £180,000 has been raised for the LMH gardens through gifts and legacies. This support is transforming our outdoor spaces – bringing new life, colour, and biodiversity to the College grounds. We are deeply grateful to everyone whose kindness is helping these plans take root and flourish.

The Garden Team has continued to work with designers and plantsmen to refresh the planting across most of our main borders, selecting plants which complement the College's architecture and which will thrive in each space. Recent replanting includes the raised bed outside the Porters' Lodge and the large circular border in the main gardens.

A major project this year has been the reworking of the borders around the Fellows' Lawn, particularly along the Deneke terrace. The terrace and its supporting walls have been re-pointed, and the lawn re-levelled for symmetry. Though parts of the garden may look bare now, new planting is planned to flourish in time for the 2028 Anniversary celebrations.

A larger greenhouse, installed in spring, is already improving plant care and team operations, and will be central to the work to transform the gardens over the next few years. The team is also now adopting digital design tools (CAD software) to manage plans and presentations in-house, streamlining project development.





What's Next?

The next key area of focus will be the Fellows' Garden. Head Gardener Oakley has drawn up plans to replace lost hedges and convert one edge into meadow. Despite its secluded, flood-prone location, the garden hosts a rich variety of species that can thrive with thoughtful, nature-led planting and management.

We continue to champion biodiversity and resilience. Guided by a 2024 baseline survey, the Garden Team promotes

wildlife through careful management, with plans underway to further enhance biodiversity across the grounds.

The vision for the future is one of connection, wellbeing, and sustainability. Alongside biodiversity and habitat projects, plans are underway to enhance spaces for everyone to enjoy – from renovating the punt house to adding new benches around the grounds. These developments will make the gardens an even more welcoming place for study, relaxation, and community life at LMH.



LADY MARGARET MAY 2025: THANK YOU

Last May, our alumni community came together online and showed extraordinary generosity to help strengthen financial support for current LMH students.

‘Lady Margaret May’, our annual online fundraising month, raised over £70,000 to help endow our Student Financial Assistance Fund. Support from 233 donors spanned the generations, from recent graduates to longer-standing members of our community. Among them were 27 first-time donors, including 11 who matriculated between 2014 and 2021, alongside particularly generous contributions from those who joined the College in the 1970s.

This support will ensure LMH remains a place where potential, not personal finances, defines opportunity. 1 in 7 of our students received financial assistance last academic year, and we want to make sure that we can continue to help those in need.

LMH was founded to break barriers and open Oxford's doors to women, and began on a financial back foot compared with those colleges founded through historic benefaction. Nonetheless, our unwavering belief in the transformative power of an LMH education – and our commitment to ensuring that the brightest students can thrive here, regardless of background – remains central to our identity.

In 2026 we will publicly launch *LMH150: Thinking for the Future*, our 150th Anniversary fundraising campaign, which will seek to secure and strengthen all that is precious about the LMH experience. Thanks to your generosity and strong market performance, our endowment has grown from £40M

in August 2020 to £64M this summer. We aim to continue this growth trajectory in the years ahead, ensuring LMH enters its next 150 years stronger, more resilient, and ready to meet the challenges of the future.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT

We are extremely grateful for the continued generosity of alumni and friends, and were delighted to close our most successful fundraising year to date in 2024-25, with over £5.5M received in donations.

Not only did we significantly exceed the £610,000 in donations required annually to sustain College operations, we also secured almost £1.7M for the endowment of Tutorial Fellowships, over half a million pounds to enable our transformative Outreach work, more than £500,000 to endow our Student Financial Support Fund, and over £100,000 to refresh the gardens and tennis courts.

A special mention must go to those who make unrestricted gifts, whether through one-off or regular donations, or through legacy bequests, allowing the College to direct funds where they are most needed. Such gifts give us the flexibility to respond to emerging needs quickly and effectively. Over £1.4M

was received in unrestricted donations, funding many areas of College life: the tutorial system; vital capital refurbishment works and subsidising student societies and activities.

My sincere thanks to everyone who contributed last year and reaffirmed the enduring value of the LMH experience. With just under 9,000 contactable alumni, every gift, of any size, makes a meaningful difference. We hope you have enjoyed reading about the transformative impact of these contributions, and that you will be inspired to continue supporting us. We look forward to seeing you soon.

We recognise the transformative impact of major gifts to LMH through our Circles of Benefaction, which celebrate those whose generosity sustains and strengthens the College.




In recognition of cumulative gifts between £10,000 & £24,999

LEGACIES: LMH IS FOR LIFE

During the last academic year, the College was the beneficiary of an exceptionally generous unrestricted legacy from the estate of Cathy Avent OBE (1939, English), who died on 3rd December 2022 at the formidable age of 103.

Cathy had a deep and enduring interest in young people, and a passionate belief in the potential of every individual. In her own reflections on her life, she expressed profound gratitude for her time at Oxford, recognising the lasting impact of her education at LMH.

After graduating in 1942, Cathy joined the Women's Royal Naval Service (WRNS or Wrens as they were commonly known). She quickly rose through training to lead a team of 34 Wrens who were monitoring German radio signals in northern Scotland. This experience confirmed her passion for working with young people at a time when careers advice was scarce. She joined the London County Council Youth Employment Bureau and, within two years, was leading its Careers Advisory Section. Her expertise led to her appointment to the Central Advisory Council for Education. Cathy was also a prolific writer and active member of professional associations, publishing six books and contributing to radio, TV, and the BBC.

Cathy gave her time to LMH generously, serving for many years on the Lady Margaret Hall Association Committee (LMHA), offering invaluable continuity and perspective to the College and the alumni community. Following terms as both President and Honorary Secretary, Cathy was elected Vice-President in 1994, an honorary title she cherished, and she continued to drive to attend regular meetings well into her nineties.

Cathy left the majority of her estate to LMH, which has enabled the restoration and renovation of Beaufort House at 1 Fyfield Road – an important and prominent part of the College, now home to 10 graduate students as well as several tutors and our Wellbeing and Study Skills teams.

We are deeply grateful for Cathy's lasting contribution to LMH, which will be honoured through a commemorative plaque in the building her legacy has revitalised.
